Day 1	Topic(s) Theme: Black Inventors Number: 4 Letter: Bb Color: Yellow & Brown Shape: Star	Foundation(s) CA3.2: Demonstrate creative expression through visual art production and presentation.
Indicators	Younger Toddlers	Older Toddlers
	Scribble and explore different colors.	Attempt to describe their drawing or identify elements in it.
Activities: Introduce the idea that inventors use their imagination to create new things. Provide toddlers with large paper and crayons, encouraging them to “design” their own invention. Younger toddlers will explore making marks on paper, while older toddlers will attempt to describe what they are drawing. Teachers can model drawing simple inventions like a house or a toy to inspire children.

Indicators	Younger Toddlers	Older Toddlers
	Attach stickers or color over their previous work.	Explain what they are adding or changing in their drawing.
Activities: Invite toddlers to revisit their drawings from Monday and add to them. Provide additional materials such as stickers, shape cutouts, and colored paper to expand their designs. Younger toddlers will explore placing stickers and shapes on their paper, while older toddlers will describe what changes they are making.

Introduce toddlers to Black inventors by showing pictures of George Washington Carver, Garrett Morgan, and Lewis Latimer. Provide toddlers with pre-cut face shapes, eyes, and accessories (e.g., hats, glasses) to create their own "inventor" portrait. Younger toddlers will explore gluing or placing pieces on the paper, while older toddlers will attempt to describe their inventor.

	Glue circles onto paper with assistance.	Recognize and name colors while arranging them in order.
Activities: Introduce Garrett Morgan and his invention of the traffic light. Show pictures of traffic lights and discuss the colors. Provide toddlers with red, yellow, and green paper circles and help them glue the circles onto a black strip to create their own traffic light. Younger toddlers will focus on placing the circles with guidance, while older toddlers will attempt to name the colors and explain their meaning.

Activities: Introduce toddlers to Lewis Latimer and explain how he improved the lightbulb. Provide them with lightbulb-shaped paper and yellow paint or tissue paper to create glowing effects. Younger toddlers will enjoy finger painting, while older toddlers will glue pieces of yellow paper to create a bright "shining" lightbulb.
